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Mission Statement

Rise Together Education is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization dedicated to improving college graduation rates by providing support and financial resources to low-income Palo Alto High School students who have been accepted to 4-year colleges or 2-year community colleges with a direct transfer agreement.

Did you know that RTE scholarship recipients receive financial assistance even before setting foot on campus? We help with housing and tuition deposits.







History and Background

Our inspiration was Stephanie. She spent her entire life living in poverty, helping to care for her siblings, and working while going to school. Despite the odds, she graduated from Palo Alto High School (Paly) in 2015 and was accepted to several universities, including San Francisco State University, her school of choice. Thanks to the efforts of the Palo Alto community, Stephanie was provided with mentoring and funding for college. Rise Together Education (RTE) began in 2015 as a proactive response for students like Stephanie, who attended school in one of the wealthiest school districts in the country, yet lived in poverty. In the 2019/2020 school year, 10% of the 2,190 students are enrolled in Free/Reduced Lunch Program and 9% are children of parents who did not attend college (aka first generation college students). We are proud to announce that In May 2019, Stephanie graduated from San Francisco State University with a 4.0 GPA and is currently studying in a Master Degree program.

Stephanie's statistics are against all odds. A national <u>study</u> published by the US Department of Education (2018) which followed three groups of students from sophomores in high school, college freshman and graduates concluded that the first generation college students were at a disadvantage. These children, as compared to those whose parents had a college degree, were less likely to go to college (46% vs 26%) and if they did attend college, at three years into college, they were more likely to drop out (33% vs 14%) and also less likely to graduate on time (48% vs 66%). Many studies have shown that coaching or mentoring contributes to the success of college students and increases graduation rates. However, in a <u>study</u> from 2018 by Strada-Gallup, data showed that 15% of first generation college students said that they did not have any mentorship with their college professors and staff. Moreover, most first generation low income students are burdened with working many hours a week to meet their expenses.

Statistics show that first generation college students are more likely to drop out and less likely to have a mentoring relationship with a faculty or staff member on their college campus.

Rise Together Education (RTE) is a Palo Alto-based nonprofit that provides multi-year mentoring to eligible low-income Paly students and financial support to Paly's graduates who are attending 4-year colleges or 2 year-colleges with a direct transfer agreement. Our long term commitment to the students starting in high school is unique to our organization. Our students



must meet the criteria of being on the federal <u>Free or Reduced Lunch Program</u> for Palo Alto Unified School District, which is equivalent to an annual income of \$47,000 per year for a family of four. We consider that if the student is low income and is qualified to enter higher education, then we will help provide financial aid regardless of their grade point average.

Working with Paly staff, RTE first identifies potential scholarship recipients during their years at Paly. RTE assists Paly's 12th graders as needed through their college decision process. When the students graduate from Paly, RTEcontinues to work with these students through their years of college. Most of our budget goes to providing scholarships to help these college students with their financial aid gaps. The number of students and the amount of scholarships RTE is able to provide is dependent upon fundraising efforts; however, our financial goal is, one day, to be able to provide scholarships up to \$5,000 per year for each student. We aim to have enough money raised to provide all of our current students through four years of attending college. We are a nonprofit organization that helps deserving students get to college and through college. As of Fall 2019, we provide \$2,500 per year to each 4-year college student and \$1,000 per year to each 2-year (community college) student. After the community college student completes their associate degree, we will provide \$2,500 per year for them to attend a 4-year college for up to two additional years.

RTE assists Paly's 12th graders as needed through the college application and decision process. Once in college, RTE stays in contact with the scholarship recipients to ensure that they receive the encouragement and financial assistance that they need to stay in college. We also connect them to other important resources such as people in their field of study and career interest.

DANIELLE HAAS-LARSON, PhD, JD Danielle grew up in Atlanta, has an undergraduate degree from Cornell, a PhD from Georgia Tech and a law degree from Stanford. She practices law in-house at Google. Volunteering has always been an important part of Danielle's life. In addition to numerous years as a room parent, she was previously the Sisterhood Co- President of The Temple in Atlanta, on the board of a (now closed) school for children with severe ADHD, and on the board of Palo Alto Girls' Softball. Danielle read the story about Stephanie in Palo Alto Online and reached out to Laura to kick off our foundation and has been serving as its founding Vice President ever since then.

MICHAEL SULLIVAN Michael is a local real estate developer and philanthropist with a strong interest in promoting and supporting access to higher education. He is a founding board member of Rise Together Education. Michael has volunteered with the Family Care Network where Michael provided mentoring and support services to children in foster homes and as a mentor and instructor with the Boys and Girls Clubs of the Peninsula. Michael attended California Polytechnic State University graduating with a B.S. in Business Administration with a concentration in Finance.

RTE was founded in 2015.

We became a 501(c)(3) nonprofit in 2016.

The members of the RTE Board of Directors consist of community members, Paly teachers and are all unpaid volunteers.



TIDA VIOLANTE, DrPH., MPH Tida is a graduate of Palo Alto High School. She is grateful for PAUSD and her teachers for helping her learn to speak and write English when she first moved here from Thailand and wants to pay that forward. She has worked as an evaluator for public health programs domestically and abroad. Following a successful international career, she brought her business talents to nonprofit organizations with deep knowledge and consistent success creating excitement and managing large community events. As a twenty year plus Palo Alto resident, she has been an extraordinarily active volunteer. Dawn is passionate about supporting the social and emotional health and welfare of all children and teens and providing opportunities for our youth's continued learning and development.

ANGELINA BENA MICHAEL, MS Angelina most recently worked as the Wellness Outreach Worker at Palo Alto High School and is also a graduate of the school. She earned a BS from Brigham Young University and Master of Science from Johns Hopkins University. 
Our Scholars

In the fall of 2019, we had a total of 45 scholarships recipients who attend colleges and universities across the country. All except for 5 students are the first generation in their families to attend an institute of higher education. Not only do they bring pride and joy to their family, but they have also made their teachers and staff at Paly very proud as well.

The number of students whom we supported from each Paly graduating class are listed below. Having established our program with the Paly community, we anticipate a large increase in the number of applicants in Spring 2020 to about 27 students.


Data show that first generation students tend to have a lower retention rate but our RTE scholarship recipients have continued their course of studies and one has graduated from college within four years.

Number of Students at 4-year Colleges & Community Colleges






Scholarship Recipients by Sex




Scholarship Recipients by Parent College Status






Cumulative Grade Point Average

Financial Summary

As an all-volunteer board, *Rise Together Education* raised money from individuals, family foundations, and events at Palo Alto High School. In 2019, through a dinner gala, at a local venue, we were able to raise more through ticket sales and donated auction items from local businesses and community members. Our expenses from 2019 included costs associated with the venue, a professional auctioneer, and fees paid to an agency for large auction items. We have spent the past five years establishing our program. Moving forward, we aim to spend 90% of the funds raised on scholarships. The majority of our expenses each year are scholarship money to college students.

In fall of 2019, the Board of Directors felt secure in the amount of money raised and voted to increase the scholarship amount to \$2,500 per year for four-year college students and \$1,000 per year for community college students (for the maximum of two years). At the end of 2019, our total asset was \$173,600. For fiscal year 2020, with an increase in applicants, we anticipate disbursing \$109,750.




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

RTE in 2020 and Beyond

As RTE has firmly established itself with the Palo Alto community, we have also increased promoting the program on the Paly campus and reaching out to Paly students and teachers in 2019. We are currently preparing for the potential of an additional 27 students graduating from the Class of 2020 who may qualify for RTE scholarships. As always, we are partnering with Paly's College and Career Counselors and sharing information with other similar organizations in the area to find more ways to help these students. We are fortunate to have the Paly Principal and two Paly teachers on the Board. Paly teachers are reaching out to low income and first-generation underclassmen to help make sure that they are college-ready and know that RTE will be there to help them.

We are working towards a steady stream of income to securely provide a larger scholarship in the future. In addition to our fundraisers, we are reaching out to local private foundations to apply for grants. We plan to work with the district to help students with the college application process through assistance such as paying for application fees, and offering a summer workshop to prepare the students to enter college.

RTE is an all-volunteer organization. We are proud to help Paly's low-income students get to and through college. We invite you to be a part of our mission to help more hardworking students like Stephanie, David, Michel, and Allison to successfully graduate from college and reach their goals in life.
